

Equity and Social Justice

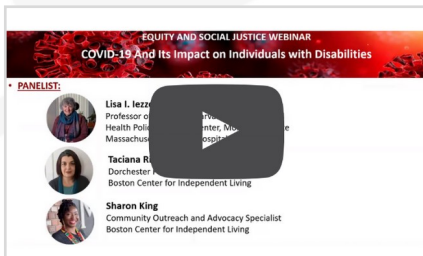
Equity and Social Justice (ESJ) is a series of lectures and dialogues that targets the Harvard Longwood community as well as communities in the greater Boston area. The series provides context to the historical, current, and future state of equity and social justice in health and health care, and engages and equips participants with tools to take action. ESJ events focus on four areas: (1) History and Context, (2) Culture and Environment, (3) Health Disparities, and (4) Leadership and Skills.

The ESJ dialogues and lectures have featured a variety of topics including: Algorithmic Bias in Medicine; American Indian Health Policy; Asian American Health; Black Men in Medicine; Black Women in Medicine; Transgender Health Research; Mental/Behavioral Health and Early Childhood Education and Interventions; Latino Cardiovascular Health; Maternal Fetal Health; Micro-Aggressions: Issues, Allies and Civility, Poetry Slam: Hidden Truths; Precision Medicine; The Public Charge; Racism Among the Well-Intentioned: Implications for Healthcare Interactions and Outcomes; Racism and Medicine; Veterans Health; Violence and Its Impact on Our Community, among others.
